First, I once again say thank you to the entire Comstock Public Schools' voting public for their support of the district's non-homestead millage. The proposal was approved by a more than a two to one margin. This is the second time in less than six months, you voters have shown your strong support for the schools at the ballot box. Thank you.

## Appreciation for Service

Mr. Paul Lamphear was appointed to the board in 2015 to fill a vacant seat. He did not win re-election; however, I along with the entire staff thank him for his service. He brought a vast amount of data analysis expertise and systems improvement knowledge to the district.
He was a positive leadership force and helped start the district on the process of evaluation for the Malcolm Baldrige Award application.
Ms. Jackie Wahl and Mr. Michael Hicks will be retiring from the board of education effective December 31, 2016. Ms. Wahl has served on the school board for eight years and Mr. Hicks has served for 10 years. Ms. Wahl and Mr. Hicks were passionate about providing the best learning environments and opportunities for students.
Ms. Wahl served as the board president and is a champion for improved student outcomes. She was board president when the voters approved the largest bond issue by the largest margin in district history.
Mr. Hicks has been a leader for robotics and technical education in the district. He also has been a strong supporter of student extracurricular activities including band and sports.
Their knowledge and leadership will be missed on the board. I along with the entire staff wish them the best in their future endeavors and thank them for their service to our students.

## Congratulations

In the recent election three board members were re-elected. Dr. Brandy Brown and Ms. Pamela

Dickinson were re-elected to four-year terms and Dr. Richard Hathaway was re-elected to a two-year term.
Three new board members were also elected. Ms. Karen Howes was elected to a four-year term and Mr. Matthew Schreiner and Mr. Jeff Van Goeye were both elected to two-year terms.
On behalf of the staff and administration, I congratulate and welcome the returning and new board members. ## Progress

The district has several major initiatives underway and the following are updates:

## Facilities Improvement/Bond Issue

In May, 2016, voters approved a $\$ 40$ million bond issue for facility improvements throughout the district. Phase one of the projects is focused on secured entrances, restroom renovations and remodeled boys and girls locker rooms at the high school. The design process is well underway with several meetings to discuss the secured entrances, restrooms and locker rooms. The designs will be finalized shortly and posted on the district website at www.comstockps.org/2016BondUpdate.
The board and administration have completed the initial phase of the district's strategic plan. The plan was presented to the board of education at the November 14, 2016, meeting. NEMS eighth graders in Liz Norton's U.S. history classes experienced Revolutionary War history through a game of Capture the Flag based on events during the war.

The activity was scripted with aspects of the traditional game where two teams each have a flag or other marker and the object is to capture the other team's flag, located at the team's base, and bring it safely back to their own base. Enemy players can be "tagged" by players in their home territory; these players are then out of that round until the next round starts.

The version the eighth graders played was changed to reflect the situation they were reenacting. The object was to have the students spread out and to capture the flags from either the British or American armies.

A third team, the French, was involved as well and joined the American team after a few rounds had been played.
Participating in this hands-on exercise gave students a new perspective on this historical event which took place in 1776 .

## How the ski $\&$ snowboard club works...

First, members buy a Bittersweet Card for \$16. They show this card at the window at Bittersweef every time they go. This gives them a large reduction off their lift ficket and equipment rental, if needed. So, the membership card helps a lot.
For students who want to ride the Ski Club bus, there is a one time fee (amount to be determined) for transportation. This pays for seven trips on Thursdays after school beginning in January. The bus leaves the tigh sthool at 3 p.m., goes down to NEMS to pidk up the middle school cub members and then heads out to Bitersweet. The bus deparits Bitiersweet af $7: 45 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. and returns to the high school for parent pick up at $8: 20 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$.
So, depending on if you need equipment, the fortal Ski Club cost for the season is:

## STEM Students Make Presentation at Stryker
