# From the Superintendent

Dear Comstock Community,

Looking back on the past few weeks and our return to school, I'm thankful for the incredibly smooth and positive start to our school year. The lion's share of the credit goes to our Colt Cabinet and district staff whose passion, preparation, and energy ensured that the focus was on our students and their academic, emotional, and social needs. Now that it's October and the fall season is upon us, let's look ahead to what the future will hold for Comstock Public Schools.

Construction projects related to the bond are continuing and will soon be completed. At Comstock Elementary, six of the eight construction phases are done. Phase 5 which consisted of the library media center and the kitchen looks fantastic. Phase 6 which focused on the modernization of three classrooms were completed on October 1 and the rooms look great. The entire elementary renovation project is still on schedule with Phase 7 scheduled to be done in January and the final phase, Phase 8, in April. To top it all off, the building is fully air conditioned.

Comstock Middle School continues its transformation. With new sidewalks and an impressive new parking lot, new exterior, nine remodeled classrooms, as well as new flooring, painting, and many other upgrades, the building has taken on a modern and clean look. As a result of the 2016 bond, our teachers now have terrific facilities to share with our middle school students and we are excited for the community to see those spaces. And in lockstep with CES, next summer CMS will be modernized with full air conditioning.

While the Comstock Early Learning Academy (CELA) didn't have any construction this summer, there's still something new there in the form of a partnership with the Confucius Institute at Western Michigan University. Teaching Chinese language and culture is Ms. Yang who is helping students make connections with a culture from the other side of the planet.

At the STEM Academy, this year promises to be full of learning about the world all around us. Students will have a year filled with robotics, bio-

## Comstock Grad Says, 'Thank You'

Dear Comstock Community,

I feel grateful to have had the privilege of calling Comstock home for over 50 years. My parents came to the area in the 1970s and chose this community because of the Comstock School District. Back then, Comstock set the standard in Southwest Michigan for what schools should offer their students. The new middle school and high school were the envy of surrounding communities, and I was lucky to have been educated in both buildings. It wasn't until returning to these facilities in the early 2000s when my son became a Comstock Colt that I realized just how fortunate I was.

Comstock's middle and high schools haven't changed much since I graduated in the early 80s. It was clear that the district did a great job of caring for these facilities, but the buildings could no longer hide their age. Today, I return to these spaces again, but in a different role. I'm no lon-

ger a student nor the parent of a student. Now, I look at these buildings through two lenses: that of a tax-paying community member and as a construction manager.

I serve as part of the Miller-Davis Company team renovating the middle school and elementary school as part of the 2016 bond proposal. When I'm on the job, I can see, first-hand, where improvements need to be made. Current renovations at the elementary and middle school buildings have had an immediate positive impact on the quality of education teachers can provide. Upgrades that include new HVAC systems, lighting, flooring, and technology allow our young people a level academic playing field to compete with peers from other districts.

While the renovations to date are a great start, further improvements are necessary. Our school buildings were designed to have an approximate life span of 50 years and, while these buildings have performed well over the past five decades,

needed updates go beyond routine maintenance. It's time to turn our attention to vital building improvements that the 2016 Bond did not include.

I have always been proud to tell people that I live in Comstock; now I want to instill that same sense of pride in a new generation by allowing them the opportunities I had as a young student. While I may no longer have children in the school system, it makes me smile to think that there is a family out there, just like mine, who chooses this community as their home because of the continued commitment we've made to our children and grandchildren.

## Students Learn from Summer Fun Camp Activities

School Social Worker Rida Jones created activities to help students with social and emotional learning at the Summer Fun Camp.

In the Climb the Emotional Rope activity, students were asked to think of a painful emotion or feeling. Then, they placed the feeling at the bottom of the rope and worked their hands up the ladder to release it.

"The intent is to have students recognize their painful feelings and understand that it is okay to let go and not hold on to them," said Ms. Jones. In the Feeling Post, students wrote positive affirmations on Post-It notes and gave them to each other

Finally, in the Pop Big Emotions Without Being Hurt, students thought of a strong emotion and then passed a token with the feeling symbolically inside without having the word "explode." This helped students learn how to regulate strong emotions.

## CPS Receives Boost in Federal, State Monies

The District has received a boost in Title III (federal) and Section 41 (state) monies this school year. Last school year, the district received \$6,855 in combined funding from both governmental sources, but this year's combined allocation will be \$13,057 which is nearly a 100 percent increase.

The purpose of Title III and Section 41 monies

is to help ensure that English learners, including immigrant children and youth, attain English proficiency and develop high levels of academic achievement.

The funding is also intended to assist teachers, including preschool teachers, administrators, and other school leaders in developing and enhancing their capacity to provide effective instructional

# District Receives \$6,000 Grant

The District has received a \$6,000 grant from the Kalamazoo Regional Educational Service Agency (KRESA) targeting social emotional learning (SEL). Assistant Superintendent Jill Ansel and School Social Worker Rida Jones co-wrote the grant which will be used to buy SEL teaching and student materials.

## CNA Graduate Starts Pen Pal Program for Nursing Home

Having witnessed first-hand the loneliness of nursing home residents during his certified nursing assistant (CNA) training, Daaren Bukhari, a 2020 graduate of Comstock's CNA program, has created a pen pal program for residents of the Alamo Nursing Home.

After graduation, Daaren began pre-med training at Michigan State University where he became chair of a service project committee. He and his fellow medical students had seen the isolation the pandemic created for nursing home residents and they decided to do something about it.

So, Daaren contacted Alamo Nursing Home where he had done his clinical experience while a CNA student at Comstock and received permission to begin the program.

"Working at a nursing home was one step in the act of being able to help these people, but I wanted to do more, so I began this project," said Daaren. "The smallest form of human connection can go such a long way for these people, and I wanted to do the best I could because human connection is most important for these people at this time of their lives."

Alamo Nursing Home resident, Renee Uitto, who has a degree in journalism from Oakland University, is enjoying emails with her pen pal. She says she has found the pen pal program to be a perfect fit for her.

Also participating in the program is medical student, Kayla Kreder, who hopes the program will help lift the residents' spirits.

"I hoped that this project would not only result in meaningful connections, but also give residents the chance to share some words of wisdom to college students," she said. "When everything is so negative, handwritten letters can offer a comforting escape from COVID-19."

# Students Explore Science in Summer Camp

Middle school students explored various areas of science through hands-on learning in this year's Summer Camp.

In the first week, students learned about engineering and design standards by planning, building, testing, and designing a mini golf course.

The next week, they became crime scene investigators and solved a crime that was committed in the science lab. They solved it by completing a blood splatter experiment that they designed, analyzing hair samples, and examining fingerprints.

In the third week, students learned about the power of hydrogen (pH) by making "magic potions." After learning about pH, acids, and bases, students created magic potions and predicted what color each potion would turn when an indicator was added.

In the final week, students again took on the role of engineers by designing and building carnival games and activities. They were prepared to host a Summer Camp Carnival for all students in grades K-5, but unfortunately the carnival was cancelled due to a power outage.

A lot of creativity was explored, new friendships made, and excitement for learning was ignited during Summer Learning Camp 2021.

Hating school when she was growing up led Izzy Longo to a career in education. She didn't learn in the traditional way, she said, so she "wanted to be there for students who

do not learn in a conventional way and adapt lessons to help them understand concepts."

So, she is the new special education teacher at Compass High School. A 2016 graduate of Troy Athens High School in Troy, Michigan, she graduated from Western Michigan University

She double-majored in elementary education and special education with a focus on emotional impairments and learning disabilities.

"I wanted to be there for students who think and process information differently and help them learn what works best for them," she said of her career choice.

Her high school orchestra teacher, Mr. Benes, influenced her in several ways.

"He always encouraged me to think outside the box and utilized movement and repetition to help me study for other classes, not just his," she said. "He really showed me what it meant to care about people and live as though you are always working, teaching, and caring."

Now that she's a teacher herself, those little "A-Ha" moments as students finally understand a concept make teaching enjoyable for her.

"I also love when I am able to teach social/ emotional lessons and life skills to help prepare my students for after high school," she said.

With the impact of the pandemic, some things about teaching are hard today.

"I think the hardest thing about teaching today is the unfamiliarity school has become," she said. "Last year was challenging for both students and teachers. Returning in person, we are expecting to go back as we were, but that is not possible.

"We are still wearing masks, using technology in the classroom differently, and keeping socially distant from others. This new normal of what education has become for both teachers and students has been the hardest thing to wrap my head around."

Providing relaxation for her outside the classroom is spending time with her sister and brother-in-law's four children: Henry, 12; John, 10; Peter, 8; and Francies, 6.

She also enjoys cooking, hiking, and playing music.

Go to the App Store and search for "Campus Portal." There are two apps: one for students and one for parents. Make sure you select the correct one. When you launch the app, it will ask you to pick your state and school district.

Once you're signed in, you will see announcements as they are posted. If you enable push notifications, you can see assignments as soon as they are graded, and any that are missed. You can also see if your student was marked absent or tardy.

It's easy to schedule conferences and contact teachers quickly, or to see your student's EDP.
