

From the Superintendent



Dear Parents,

According to the York Once again there are major changes at the state level in student assessments. The Michigan Department of Education (MDE)

and Michael Flanagan, state superintendent, announced that for the 2015-16 school year, the state will be administering the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) as opposed to the American College Testing (ACT) exam. In the world of high school assessments and college entrance exams, this is a huge change.

After the MDE received proposals from testing companies last March, an evaluation team from the MDE, local school districts and ISDs evaluated the proposals for several months and recommended the SAT. One of the major reasons cited for this recommendation was a \$15 million cost savings over three years versus using the ACT. In addition to the cost savings, SAT is providing student and staff support items which with the ACT would have been additional charges.

I want to assure every parent in the district that the board, administration and staff of Comstock Public Schools will be working tirelessly to help our students do as well as they can on the SAT.

The Board of Education has been presented with

information regarding the changed has directed me to take the necessary measures to ensure our students are prepared and ready to take the SAT. Jill Ansel, director of curriculum, assessment and instruction, has already been researching and communicating to staff about the change and what we need to do to support our students.

The College and Career Academy Deans are preparing plans on how to manage the change for students and parents. There are several initiatives in the works. I want to assure all parents that the Comstock staff is working hard to assist their students through this change.

As I mentioned in my last letter, the Michigan Student Test of Educational Progress (M-STEP) is now the state assessment test for all students in grades 3 through 8.

There is now information on the district website that provides information regarding the test and how students can do additional preparation at home. Please visit Comstockps.org/curriculum for more information regarding the district wide campaign - called #STEPupyourgame - to prepare and motivate students.

Travis Law, Comstock High School English Teacher. Travis is using his grant to purchase equipment to videotape students in his public speaking, drama and basic media classes. By viewing and analyzing their performances, students will be able to improve their confidence and presence in public speaking.

Lacey is using her grant to purchase Clan of the Cave Bear books for a book study with a book that isn't a textbook but relates to science and connects with the current content in her curriculum. State Develops New Assessment Test



In June 2014 the Michigan Legislature required the Michigan Department of Education (MDE) to develop a new test for spring 2015. The new assessment system is called the Michigan Student Test of Educational Progress, or M-STEP.

The M-STEP will include summative assessments designed to measure student growth effectively for today's students. English language arts and mathematics will be assessed in grades 3-8, science

in grades 4 and 7, and social studies in grades 5 and 8. It also includes the Michigan Merit Examination in 11th grade which consists of the ACT Plus Writing, WorkKeys, and M-STEP summative in English language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies.

Comstock Public Schools is promoting #STEPupyourgame as a district-wide campaign to encourage students to do their best on the Spring Assessments.

Shirley Gilland



Shirley Gilland can't imagine a better way to spend the day than with kids. It's something she's been doing at Comstock for 22 years, having taught second, third, and fifth grades at Gull Road, North and East, and now at Northeast Middle School.

"I love working with kids," she said. "Interacting with them on a daily basis keeps you feeling young and sometimes reminds you not to take things so seriously."

She gets excited as she watches students apply something they've learned to their lives. And then there's the fascination of all the different personalities she interacts with each day.

"Sharing my culture and background with students helps us all to realize that as different as we may be, when we come into our classroom our becomes one," she said.

A favorite classroom memory centers around a student who hated to read but she kept trying to find books that would interest him. Finally, after several months, the student's father came in to tell her that he had just checked out several library books in the series that his son was now reading.

"Their gratitude and appreciation I have never forgotten," she said. "It reminds me never to give up on a child."

She's inspired to become a better teacer by her own children, others she comes into contact with and her own life experiences.

"When former Comstock students come to visit me or I run into them at a store or restaurant, the hugs, smiles, or looks of disbelief on their faces make everything worthwhile," she said. "Many times they're taller than me and they have become very independent since fifth grade."

Inspiration is needed in education today because of the many challenges teachers face, such as finding the right way to challenge students and ignite their curiosity, she said. Today's students also face many challenges that in the past maybe only a couple of students in a classroom faced.

"Learning about the First Americans and their challenges seems irrelevant when students are thinking about the Americans in their homes that don't have jobs or food to put on the table," she said. "My job is to make the past relevant and find various ways to connect it to the present day life that children are experiencing."

Part of her job is also to help students to understand that they need to come to school and do their best daily, she said.

"A solid education will help them to make the best choices and hopefully eliminate some of the challenges that they will face," she said.

Mrs. Gilland is a graduate of Western Michigan University where she majored in elementary education with a minor in science. She also has a master's degree in reading.

"Teaching is my calling," said Green dow second grade teacher, Sara Howard. " I am grateful to know that about myself because every day I get to go to work and know I am doing what I am meant to do."

In her eighth year of teaching, seven of those at Green Meadow,

"To be able to influence children to make responsible choices in their lives and to expand their knowledge is so rewarding," she said.

While there are many special things about being a teacher, she especially enjoys the Turkey Notes which staff members receive around Thanksgiving.

"I hope the Middle School knows how special these notes are to staff members," she said.

Conferences are also a fun time especially when older siblings of current students come back to the building.

"It is fun to catch up with former students and hear them brag to their old teacher about their successes," she said. "It is also nice to catch up with former parents, grandparents, and other family members that I have made connections with over the years."

"I like to think that my daily teaching, combined with the efforts of everyone else in the lives of our students, helps kids take baby steps toward building a brighter future for themselves and for our world," she said. "I realize that a huge impact may not be able to be made daily but I sure do get up every morning to try to make a difference."

Part of making a difference is meeting the needs of diverse learners in the classroom, one of the biggest challenges for teachers today.

"Every day I reflect on what I could have done differently, what I could have done better, or what other strategies I could have used to help my students," she said. "I am constantly learning and trying to make improvements in the classroom myself."

She credits her colleagues in the district for helping with that momentous task.

"I am thankful to work with a group of educators willing to meet consistently to review data, to share ideas, and to collaborate in order to meet the needs of every stu-

Mrs. Howard and her husband, Chad, who teaches in the Young Adult Program, have a son, Ben, and are expecting their daughter, Nina, in April.

"My husband and I are like kids ourselves again while we try to keep up with our toddler," she said. "We play outside a lot, build with blocks, play with trains, read,

Certified Nurse Aide (CNA) Training

Community Comstock Public Schools Education Center, 3010 Gull Road, offers a Certified Nurse Aide Training monthly.

Our intensive 80-hour course meets all of the requirements of the State of Michigan Certified Nurse Aide Training program.

Course content includes: long-term care facilities, physical and emotional needs of residents, resident rights, communication skills, death and dying, special needs including dementia care, vital signs, infection control techniques, observations, medical terminology, body mechanics, transfers, walkers, canes, positioning in bed, nutrition, intake and output, elimination needs, skin care, foot care, dressing, bathing, bed making, mouth care and first aid. Homework is required.

Class consists of 10 classroom days from 8 a.m.-2:30 p.m. Three nursing home days from 7 a.m.-2 p.m. are required.

Class size is limited to 24 students. Tuition is \$700, due at the time of registration. You get to keep the book.

A nurse aide uniform, appropriate shoes and a watch with a second hand are required. Students who desire state certification pay an additional \$176 to the State of Michigan to take the state

Students Enjoy Relaxing, Learning About Psychology

Imagine students entering their psychology class stressed out from teen life today as they try to balance school, homework, and jobs, but leaving an hour later feeling calm and renewed.

Juniors and seniors in Kimberly Adams' dual enrollment/KVCC Psychology 150 class experienced that during a presentation by Dr. Richard Dama, counselor and clinical hypnotherapist.

One student said, "Wow! I came into the iss today all hyped up from all the pressure and work I need to do in all my classes and life and am walking out of here feeling like I just slept for days. I am totally calm and can think clearly to do what I need to do today. So cool!"

But it was also a learning experience for the students through Dr. Dama's presentation which explained treatments for stress and anxiety management, fears and phobias, sleep issues, confidence and self-esteem, depression and anger management, public speaking and stage fright, and even test-taking performance and recall. He said, too, that hypnosis is considered by many professional and medical associations to be a valid treatment method for many different conditions.

He demonstrated this by placing a volunteer into a "trance" or hypnosis, an activity all students had been informed of and agreed to prior to Dr. Dama's visit. While most students prepared to relax and/or participate the demonstration, some were still skeptical and questioned the validity of the experiment and chose to observe rather than engage in the hypnosis themselves.

Later, those observers all agreed Dr. Dama's calming voice had an effect on them and were surprised that several classmates truly went "under or into a trance" and appeared to be completely calm and relaxed.

After the presentation, Dr. Dama answered questions and students reported they were in awe of how relaxing his time with them was. But they also learned a lot.

"He was fantastic," said senior Coree Hamstra. "I just learned so much!"

Another student, Jordan Baker, said, "Can't we have him back? I want to learn so much more!"

Dr. Dama had been invited to speak to the class by the instructor, Ms. Adams. Having done two presentations to the class this fall, he will be returning later in the year to do more teaching about psychology.

"He's just a fantastic speaker for my students to learn some of the practical applications of psychology," said Ms. Adams. "I believe my students learn so much more from a speaker, in the field of study, that supports what I or the book may present in class. And he is a lot of fun.

"We are so grateful to Dr. Dama for taking time out of his schedule to share his information, wisdom and insight into the field of psychology."

Dr. Dama, a board certified advanced clinical hypnotherapist with over 35 years of experience, is a regular presenter at colleges and universities and at regional, national and international conferences. He also writes a blog on Facebook.

Parents, Students Learn about Cyber Safety

Representatives from the Michigan Cyber Safety Initiative (CSI) recently taught parents and students about how to be safe when using the internet. CSI's customized programs teach children the importance of being safe, making smart decisions, and protecting themselves and others while online.

Fifth graders were taught to recognize common internet predator grooming techniques, as well as additional appropriate responses to bullying and cyberbullying. Students were also introduced to the OK2SAY student safety hotline, but were encouraged to always talk to a trusted adult first.

The new student safety hotline, OK2SAY, is a confidential way to file reports on potential harm or criminal activity involving students, school employees, and schools. Tips can be submitted 24/7 via telephone, text message, email, mobile app, or the OK2SAY website.

The presentation for sixth through eighth grade students gave an in-depth explanation of OK2SAY - how it works, what types of incidents they can report, how to submit a tip, and what will happen with the tip. Students then received detailed explanations about bullying, cyberbullying, suicide, sexting, sexual abuse, the predator threat, and how to protect themselves online. Videos were shown relating stories of teenage survivors of internet predators, of Michigan teens who have died by suicide, and the impact of sexting.

The information in these sessions complements information present n the technology classes taught by ???? Cousins, who always warns stude against putting too much personal information on the internet via Facebook, Tweeting or on Twitter. Once you post a picture or other private information, those details will be in cyberspace forever, he tells students.

Parents were also invited to attend the CSI sessions with their students, but for those who could not attend during the day, an evening presentation was provided, including a question and answer session. A handout was provided that listed 15 Social Media Sites parents need to know about. Each site was broken down with a rating of: No Concerns, Requires Monitoring, or NOT RECOMMENDED. 
better grades, perform better on tests and are more likely to stay in school than their classmates who miss two or more days a month. These important reasons are why we celebrate good attendance at North Elementary.

Students had artwork and writings with a Thanksgiving theme on display in the gym for everyone to enjoy.


November No Referral Celebration


This annual competition had a wide range of entries this year. There were writing samples, photographs, book-inspired, movie-inspired, and song- inspired doors.
