From the Superintendent

Dear Comstock Community,

A sincere and hearty thanks to everyone for the wonderful start to the 2018-19 school year! Due to an amazing effort by our maintenance and work crews as well as our custodians, important construction projects were finished and the buildings were clean and ready to go.

Our terrific teachers, support staff, and principals had prepared for the arrival of parents and students by decorating the buildings, organizing the offices, and stocking classrooms full of instructional supplies and materials.

I visited each of our six buildings personally on this special day and watched the educational and instructional process for our students begin anew. It was truly a thrill.

With students back in class, we can turn our attention, energy, and focus onto our district's primary mission of supporting, inspiring, and challenging students, teachers and staff within the district to reach their full potential through education.

To make this mission real and tangible, I created an instructional and leadership model which I introduced to teachers and staff at our opening day breakfast. And now, I would like to introduce it to the community.

The center or heart of the model consists of the District's Mission surrounded by four major components or quadrants (see adjacent graphic) - Instructional Vision, Leadership Principles, Leadership Vision, and Organizational Goals.

Instructional Vision - All of our instructional staff including teachers, paraprofessionals, and curriculum and behavioral coaches will use practices that are relevant, progressive, and evidence-based. Essentially, the educators will use what works but their practices must

Challenged by reading her whole life, Kaitlynn Baylerian always looked down on herself because she couldn't read as well as the other students.

"I don't remember reading books past a certain age," she said. "I remember faking it and pretending so that no one noticed that I wasn't reading as fast as everyone else."

With the support of her family and some of her teachers, she made it through those hard times and decided to become a teacher.

"I became a teacher to help kids who struggle like I do know that it's ok if they aren't like everyone else and that they can still do whatever they want to in life," she said.

She began her teaching career at Arborwood Elementary in Monroe, Michigan, where she taught reading intervention for a year and then third and fourth grades for three years. At Comstock, she is teaching fourth grade at Green Meadow Elementary.




Athletic Director Justin Ansel hopes the fee elimination will increase participation in all sports.

Comstock's Health Care Training Programs Provide Many Benefits

Comstock now has two programs to train those who are interested in working in health care. In August of this year, a new Health Care Worker program was started in conjunction with the State MI Works Program.

This program provides skill competency for those working in the community where a CNA certification is not required such as home care and assisted living facilities.

For those desiring CNA certification, the Comstock Certified Nurse Aide Program, which began in 1991, is a vibrant program offering the opportunity to 22 new students every month to complete a ten-day classroom and lab experience and three days of clinical experience at a local nursing home. We offer a Michigan State licensed CNA Program of 81 hours that is comprehensive and flexible to meet the individual needs of our students.

Our program has six RN Instructors with a variety of hospital, community and hospice experience and four instructors who are State Train-the-Trainer Certified. We offer onsite TB skin testing required for the nursing home clinical experience, resume development, and review days after graduation to prepare for the state CNA exam.

We help our students learn more than 25 skills in a nine-day period. We work with MI Works, Path and Michigan Rehabilitation Services to support the success of our students.

The CNA Program provides new career opportunities as soon as day nine of the program when students are involved in an onsite job fair with approximately 16 agencies interviewing for immediate job openings. Often employment offers are extended the same day. The Comstock CNA Program provides new career opportunities and advancement in current jobs after students pass their State Certification testing. We provide this successful outcome for approximately 200 students each year. This training that provides new employment for our students also brings needed relief to the shortfall of aides in our community hospitals, nursing homes, assisted living facilities, home care agencies, memory care facilities and hospice.

Many agencies are now sponsoring students to attend CNA classes by paying the \$980 tuition and providing job security after completion of the program. Due to our vision and program development, we have received valuable donations to our skills lab of over \$20,000.

Our goal in the CNA Program is to prepare confident caregivers to successfully obtain and retain employment in the health care arena. Our students provide care to residents at home and in health-care facilities. Some use this training as a stepping stone to further training as a future RN, physician assistant or doctor.

The success of our program is represented by many of our students who have made a valuable impact in the community and the individuals in their care. CNA graduate Julia Larkin has successfully launched her own home care business called Grandsitting. Another CNA graduate, Brittney Horton, provides CNA care in a nursing home, acts as a home care representative to our job fairs and evaluates aides in the home.

Hazardous Weather Communications

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With hazardous weather conditions just around the corner, Comstock Public Schools is encouraging all parents to talk with their children about the possibility of school closing due to bad weather. In the event that school must be closed early on any given day, please have a plan developed with your children so they arrive home safely.

Every effort is made to make a decision to close school by 5 a.m. and to notify the news media immediately. However, the district has no control over how quickly the information is disseminated by the media.

Below is a list of the multiple ways you can be notified of early closings, or school closings:
