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# From the Superintendent 



Dear Parents,
The Comstock Public Schools will be offering five new STEM-related courses through the national Project Lead The Way (PLTW) organization. Project Lead The Way’s mission is to prepare students for the global economy. PLTW works with schools and private industry to provide high quality STEM programming to students.

Several teachers from the High School, Northeast Middle School and the STEM Academy have received extensive training over the summer to be properly prepared to teach these new courses.

The new courses being offered are:

## Introduction to Engineering Design (IED, 1 year)

Students dig deep into the engineering design process, applying math, science, and engineering standards to hands-on projects. They work both individually and in teams to design solutions to a variety of problems using 3D modeling software, using an engineering notebook to document their work.

The IED course will be offered at Comstock High School, giving students a great advantage when they go to college.

## Introduction to Design and Modeling (IDM)

Students apply the design process to solve problems and understand the influence of creativity and innovation in their lives. They work in teams to design a playground and furniture, capturing research and ideas in their engineering notebooks. Using Autodesk® design software, students create a virtual image of their designs and produce a portfolio to showcase their innovative solutions.

The IDM course will be taught at Northeast Middle School as an elective course to prepare students to pursue STEM-related studies at the high school and beyond.

## Introduction to Computer Science (ICS)

Studies show that by 2018, 1.4 million job openings will be available for computer specialists. In this unit, students discover the principles of this fast-growing field by focusing on creativity and an iterative design process as they create their own basic apps using MIT App Inventor.

The ICS course will be taught at Northeast Middle School as an elective course.

## Principles of Biomedical Science (PBS)

In the introductory course of the PLTW Biomedical Science program, students explore concepts of biology and medicine to determine factors that led to the death of a fictional person. While investigating the case, students examine autopsy reports, investigate medical history, and explore medical treatments that might have prolonged the person's life.

The activities and projects introduce students to human physiology, basic biology, medicine, and research processes while allowing them to design their own experiments to solve problems.

Normally this course is only offered at the high school level; however, PLTW is allowing the Comstock Public Schools' STEM Academy to offer it to all eighth grade students. The STEM Academy is the only eighth grade program in the nation offering this PLTW course. All eighth grade students at the STEM Academy will be participating in this program.

## Automation and Robotics (A\&R)

Students trace the history, development, and influence of automation and robotics as they learn about mechanical systems, energy transfer, machine automation, and computer control systems. Students use the VEX Robotics® platform to design, build, and program real-world objects such as traffic lights, toll booths, and robotic arms.

The A\&R course will be taught to all sixth and seventh grade students at the STEM Academy.

## The Brookings Institute reports the following regarding STEM jobs:

As of 2011, 26 million U.S. jobs- 20 percent of all jobs-require a high level of knowledge in any one STEM field.

Half of all STEM jobs are available to workers without a four-year college degree, and these jobs pay $\$ 53,000$ on average-a wage 10 percent higher than jobs with similar educational requirements.

Comstock Public Schools is working hard to ensure that students are prepared to compete in a global economy. Part of that preparation is increasing the offerings and rigor of STEM related courses. By challenging our students now, we will be helping them to reap success in the future.

## DISTRICT ANNUAL NOTIFICATIONS

## Confidentiality of Educational Records

The school district has compiled records on all students for use in the provision of appropriate education programs and services. Federal and State legislation provides parents and eligible students (18 years and older) with certain rights regarding the confidentiality of school records.

## Student Records

- Personal and family data
- Health and immunization records
- Test data including aptitude, interest, intelligence, and achievement testing
- Achievement and attendance records
- Anecdotal records
- Records of conferences
- Copies of correspondence concerning a student
- Student questionnaires
- Other records which may contribute to the understanding of the student
- Past school records from other districts
- Individualized educational plans for handicapped students


## Procedures Relating to Retention, Destruction, and Disclosure of Records

Records are maintained at the building in which the student is enrolled or last attended. Each record is kept in an individual file open only to those personnel who have a need to know. Information on grades, attendance, and courses completed are kept forever unless transferred to another school district. Portions of a record may be destroyed when it is no longer appropriate to retain them.

## Parental and Student Rights

Parents of a student or an eligible student have the right to:

- Inspect and review the educational records of the student
- Request information contained in such records be amended if it is inaccurate, misleading or violates the privacy or other rights of the student.
- Request a hearing to challenge the content of the student's record.


## Access Procedures

Parents or eligible students who wish to review the student's educational records shall request at the attending building. A review shall be scheduled within a reasonable time not to exceed thirty days.

## Disclosure to Third Parties

Personally identifiable information from the educational record of the student shall not be released without the prior consent of the parent or eligible student. Information may be released to certain individuals or agencies as permitted by law.

## Directory Information

The district provides directory information which includes: name, address, telephone, date and place of birth, weight and height, participation in school activities, dates of attendance, awards received, and other similar information. Directory information may be released unless parent or eligible student refuses such release. The refusal must be made to the superintendent's office within 10 days of the publication of this notice.

## Special Education and Section 504 Notifications

It is the policy of the district to actively find and provide services to handicapped students. The district will provide appropriate evaluations, identification and services for all eligible students under Section 504 of the Vocational Rehabilitation Act of 1973 or current special education laws.

## Administrative Policies and Procedures Complaint Procedures

The district does not discriminate on the basis of disability, sex, age, or race with regard to admission, access to services, treatment, or employment in programs and activities.

The district has a coordinator responsible for Section 504, the American Disabilities Act and Special Education. Contact your building principal for that person's name and telephone.

The district policies and procedures are on file in the superintendent's office and may be reviewed there.

You may file a complaint regarding a district policy or procedure. Please contact the superintendent and receive the specific process for the legislation for which you believe the district is in noncompliance.

## Weapons-Free School Zone

Comstock Public Schools is a Weapons-Free School Zone. Violators may face expulsion and/or criminal prosecution. Firearms of any type are prohibited, as are knives, bow and arrows, and any type of explosive devices.

## Drug Prevention

In accordance with Federal and State Law, the Comstock Public Schools Board of Education hereby establishes a "Drug-Free School Zone" that extends 1,000 feet from the boundary of any school property. The Board prohibits the use, possession, concealment, delivery, on property, within the Drug-Free School Zone or at any districtrelated event. Furthermore, the Superintendent shall take the necessary steps to ensure that an individual, eighteen (18) years of age or older, who knowingly delivers or distributes controlled substance on designated and prohibited by Michigan statute within the Drug-Free School Zone to another person is prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law.

## Terrie Forsch

Terrie Forsch has had a varied as well as a cross-country teaching career. She started teaching in a two-room schoolhouse on the Cheyenne-Eagle Butte Indian Reservation in South Dakota. She taught all subjects in fifth through eighth grades before moving to Eagle Butte where she taught second grade and was assistant coach for swimming and track.
When her father died, she returned to Michigan to help her mother, taking a job at First of America Computer Services. She missed teaching so she began substituting, but she also missed living out west so she moved to Nevada where she taught seventh and eighth graders for three years and coached girls basketball.

Then, with her master's degree in special education: learning disabilities, she taught special education at the high school.
"I co-taught with teachers from the history and English departments in addition to teaching skills classes for ninth and tenth graders," she said.

After a couple of years at the high school, she applied for a seventh grade language arts position at the Middle School where she has been for more than 12 years.
"I went into education because I enjoy working with young people," she said. "I enjoy watching their eyes light up when they have an understanding of something new. I enjoy watching them grow and mature as the year goes on."

Over her many years in education she has seen many changes, especially all the new technology.
"Computers and iPads have helped immensely with not only the lesson delivery, but the business end of teaching," she said. "I am thankful I do not have to calculate grades anymore."

And she's very glad to have seen the end of the mimeograph machine.
"Our new copy machines are wonderful---No more purple ink on my clothes and face because the mimeograph machine wasn't working proper-

## ly," she said.

In retirement, she is mainly excited to have more time to read, travel, and spend more time with family, including her husband, Rob, and their daughters, Katelyn and Sara who are business majors.
"Some of my new free time will be spent at our cabin on Lake Superior looking for beach glass, picking wild blueberries, taking long walks along the beach and reading on the beach," she said.

Overall, her career has been fulfilling.
"I have had the pleasure of getting to know some really awesome young people," she said. "They have been quite amazing. Getting to know so many students and their families has been a very fulfilling journey for me."

The last steps are to determine the acceleration of the projectile and multiply that by its mass so you now have the amount of force exerted by the catapult. Many visitors had a good time letting
