## From the Superintendent



Dear Comstock Public Schools Community,
The Comstock Public Schools' Board of Education approved placing a bond issue on the May 3, 2016, ballot. The Board of Education is asking voters to approve a $\$ 40$ million bond that would be issued in three phases over nine (9) years. If approved, the bond issue would not increase millage rates. Currently, the district has two outstanding bond issues, one from 1991 and one from 2010. The total millage for those issues is five (5) mills. The projected millage for the new bond issue, if passed, would not exceed the five (5) mills currently being levied.
Thus, there will be no increase in the tax rate.

## Cathy Buscher Wins First Rena H. Brooks Award

North Elementary kindergarten teacher, Cathy Buscher, has been awarded the first Rena H. Brooks Excellence in Early Education Award in the amount of \$500.
This new award, to be given annually, was established by Rena H. Brooks' sons, Malcolm (Chip), David, and Robert, to honor their mother who taught early elementary grades from 1953 to 1994, with 32 of those years in the Comstock schools, mostly at Green Meadow

Mrs. Brooks loved teaching, and being an influential teacher was important to her. She was recognized by her colleagues as an outstanding teacher, but the proof is in four decades of students who came to love learning through her efforts.

She believed then, and believes today, that being a great teacher requires patience, flexibility, a joy for teaching, a sense of humor, a positive relationship with staff and parents, and a talent for making learning fun and interesting.

Ms. Buscher plans to use her grant to purchase tablets to allow students to be exposed to more reading and math materials that focus on their target skills level.

## Education Center Offers Certified <br> Nurse Aide Training

Comstock Public Schools Community Education Center, 3010 Gull Road, offers a Certified Nurse Aide (CNA) Training monthly.

Our intensive 80 hour course meets all of the requirements of the State of Michigan Certified Nurse Aide Training program. Course content includes: long-term care facilities, physical and emotional needs of residents, resident rights, communication skills, death and dying, special needs including dementia care, vital signs, infection control techniques, observations, medical terminology, body mechanics, transfers, walkers, canes, positioning in bed, nutrition, intake and output, elimination needs, skin care, foot care, dressing, bathing, bed making, mouth care and first aid. Homework is required.
The class consists of 10 classroom days from 8 a.m.-2:30 p.m. Also, three nursing home days from 7 a.m. -2 p.m. are required. Class size is limited to 24 students.
Tuition is $\$ 700$, due at the time of registration. You get to keep the book. A nurse aide uniform, appropriate shoes and a watch with a second hand are required.
Students who desire state certification pay an additional $\$ 125$ to the State of Michigan to take the state test. Upcoming class dates with availability are April 25, July 5, August 1 and August 29

network switching and routing equipment and replacement of student computing devices.
The board's highest priority for students is always safety. The board has made improving student, staff and community safety a major focus of this bond proposal. If the voters approve the bond proposal, all school buildings would have their entrances secured. Other safety enhancements such as exterior door replacement, outdoor lighting improvements and improved traffic flow at school facilities would be included.
One thing to keep in mind about our district is that almost all of our buildings are at least 50 years old. The oldest building is the STEM Academy at 67 years old. The average age of all of our buildings is 57 .
The table at the right gives you the date of original construction and years of major improvements or renovations. The board recognizes that the community has made significant investments in these buildings and wants to continue as good stewards of the community's assets.
