

From the Superintendent



Dear Comstock Schools Community,

The summer of 2016 was one of busiest on record for Comstock Public Schools. Here are a few highlights:

- WiFi As part of the recently passed bond issue, the technology department has expanded coverage to all areas of all buildings. Additionally, the capacity of the WiFi has been increased to support the over 700 new Chromebooks that are in use in the district.
- Chromebooks The district now has over 700 Chromebooks being used by students on a daily basis. Students use the Chromebooks across the curriculum while also improving their computer technology skills.
- High School Fitness Room The board approved all new equipment for the high school fitness room. The equipment is state-of-the-art and will be used by hundreds of high school students daily. The new equipment will ensure our physical education students and athletes have safe and high quality equipment
- Strategic Planning The Board of Education conducted a district strategic planning session with representation from parents, community members, staff and the board. The session identified the key issues facing the district and set goals. The next step is to take those goals and develop strategies and plans to achieve the goals.
- New High School Principal The Board approved Ms. Gerielle Stewart as the new high school principal. Ms. Stewart was previously the Director of the College and Career Academy and the Director of the STEM Academy, both programs that have seen considerable success. Her passion is increasing the opportunities for our high school students and creating a culture of success for all.

During the coming months, the district will begin the process of planning, designing and bidding projects for Phase 1 of the bond issue. These projects include secured entrances at all buildings, renovation of restrooms at all buildings and renovating all the high school locker rooms. Overall the district will be investing approximately \$8,000,000 in Phase 1. Please check our website www.comstockps.org for continued updates on construction projects.


