## From the Superintendent



Dear Comstock Public Schools Community,
Thank you, Comstock Voters!
The approval of the $\$ 40.1$ million bond issue on Tuesday, May 3, 2016, was a historic event that will positively impact the lives of our students and their education going forward.

I have been asked many questions about what projects are included in the facilities improvement plan, when they will be completed and how the district is going to keep the community informed about the progress.
First, the bond issue is being issued in three series. The first series will be issued in 2016 and is for $\$ 8$ million. The projects in Series 1 are: secured entrances at all buildings, technology infrastructure and devices, and restroom upgrades at all buildings.
The second series of bonds will be issued in 2019. The total amount of the second series will be $\$ 16$ million. The projects included in Series 2 will be: technology device replacement, NEMS facility upgrade (approximately $\$ 10$ million of the $\$ 16$ million), parking lot lighting replacement, and site improvements at the high school.
The third series of the bonds will be issued in 2022 and will be for $\$ 16$ million. The projects contained in the final series will be: technology infrastructure and device replacements, high school renovations (approximately $\$ 10$ million of the $\$ 16$ million), and roof replacements.
Issuing the bonds in three series instead of all at once will save the taxpayers over $\$ 14$ million based on interest rate assumptions and conservative property tax growth estimates.
The board values financial stewardship highly and wanted to ensure that any bond issue presented to the voters reflected their values.
The board and administration want to continue communication with the entire community regarding this major investment in the school facilities. To that end, the district will be hosting community forums to gain input and communicate progress as well as posting project update information on the website, www. comstockps.org. Please check the website for forum dates and times.
Once again, thank you very much, Comstock voters, for making this investment in our students and their future.

## Education Center Offers Certified Nurse Aide Training

Comstock Public Schools Community Education Center, 3010 Gull Road, offers a Certified Nurse Aide Training monthly.

Our intensive 80 -hour course meets all of the requirements of the State of Michigan Certified Nurse Aide Training program. Course content includes: long-term care facilities, physical and emotional needs of residents, resident rights, communication skills, death and dying, special needs including dementia care, vital signs, infection control techniques, observations, medical terminology, body mechanics, transfers, walkers, canes, positioning in bed, nutrition, intake and output, elimination needs, skin care, foot care, dressing, bathing, bed making, mouth care and first aid. Homework is required.
The class consists of 10 classroom days from 8 a.m.-2:30 p.m. and three nursing home days from 7 a.m. -2 p.m. are required. Class size is limited to 22 students.
Tuition is $\$ 850$, due at the time of registration. You get to keep the book. A nurse aide uniform, appropriate shoes and a watch with a second hand are required.
Students who desire state certification pay an additional $\$ 125$ to the State of Michigan to take the state test.

## Requirements:

- Child must be 5 by September 1, 2016
- Birth Certificate
- Proof of Residency (Consumer's bill, lease, etc.)
- Immunizations
- Hearing and Vision Screening

All students will need to be tested for readiness, so please don't wait until school has resumed in the fall to register. It is to everyone's advantage if classes can be formed and all necessary staff can be in place prior to school starting.

If your child will not be 5 by September 1, you may register for one of the 4 -year old Pre-K programs. These spots are not guaranteed and fill up very quickly so please don't wait until fall and end up being placed on a waiting list. There are also programs for children who will be 3 years old by September 1, 2016.

To register for kindergarten, the 3 or 4 year old Pre-K programs or if you have questions, be aware that the North Elementary office will be open weekdays until June 24 from 8:30 a.m. -4 p.m. The office will be closed Memorial Day and June 20, 21 and 22.

By participating in the Earn-a-Bike program, students get hands-on instruction in bicycle mechanical skills, ROADS (Respect, Ownership of Actions, Attitude,

## Our Mission

The Junior Golf Association (JGA) was established in 1987 with the purpose of providing quality golf experiences for area juniors at affordable rates. In 2015, JGA obtained 501(c)(3) non-profit status and was renamed Kalamazoo Junior Golf Association (KJGA) with an additional purpose of using the game of golf to help young people of all backgrounds develop fundamental values such as integrity, sportsmanship, and resiliency.
Many former Comstock students have participated in the KJGA program and gone on to have wonderful golf careers at Comstock High School, including Sawyer Heffner, John Scholly, Kelsey Wiers, Megan and Mikala Sims...just to name a few!

## How does one decide which program(s) to enter?

The KJGA is tournament-oriented, the Junior Golf Leagues are recreational, and the Junior Golf Clinics and Competition Camps are instructional. Finding the best program(s) is dependent on the ability of the junior: Beginner, Intermediate, or Advanced.
Advanced or tournament players will fit best in the KJGA tournaments or the Competition Camps.
Intermediate or recreational players will enjoy all programs.
Beginners should start with a Junior Golf Clinic or the Instructional program and then decide which program they would fit into best after the instruction. Private lessons are offered for all ages and ability levels.
Private lessons can also be with Woody Capron at Hickory Ridge, Paul Simonds at Eastern Hills, GPA Academy at Milham with Clark Petersen or with LPGA legend Bonnie Bryant at Golf Services.
PGA Professional and director of golf for the KMGA, Dean Marks, is an award-winning instructor who began the JGA program in 1987. He along with several volunteer coaches including current Comstock High School girls golf coach, Tracy Daniel, run the KJGA instructionals for 12 and under golfers every Tuesday at Grand Prairie golf course. This is an excellent and affordable way for younger players to begin playing golf.
Coach Daniel will also be holding instructing girls golf sessions for potential middle school and high school golfers this summer at Hickory Ridge every Monday and Wednesday from 10 a.m.-2 p.m., free of charge.

## Band of Blue Leads Disney Parade in Orlando

Comstock High School's Band of Blue recently led the Main Street Electric Light Parade at Disney World in Orlando, Florida, the second time the band has been honored with that position.

The band performs at Disney World every four years and their reputation for excellence led to their being asked to lead the parade first in 2012 and again in 2016, said Mark Nelson, band director.

According to Mr. Nelson, the band's Disney guide, Patrick, told them, "It's one thing to be accepted for the parade and it's one step up to be in the evening parade. Then, it's an even greater honor to be the lead band and we want to give you that honor because of your excellent reputation and record with us."

Playing songs from their fall marching program, Disney Bound, the band got a wonderful response from the people lining the parade route, said Mr . Nelson.
"You could tell they were enjoying this and that they were enjoying the music," he said.

The band played segments of Zip-a-Dee-DooDah and Pirates of the Caribbean, a Disney film.

Patrick was also impressed that the band played Disney songs and not just the school fight song.
"We appreciate that," said Patrick.
After their performance, Mr. Nelson told the students about the high praise the band had gotten from Patrick.
"I think they need to know this," he said. "I told them that there is payoff in doing things right and being cordial and respectful and this is one of them."

Getting invited to play at Disney World starts with an application process that includes submitting a video of the band performing.
"You have to make the cut," said Mr. Nelson. "There's a cut for the bands that want to play in the parade and there's a higher standard if you want the evening parade."
The Band of Blue was chosen for the evening parade.
"That's the parade that most bands try to get into," he said. "We were very happy about that."

The band does a January pizza fundraiser to raise funds for the trip which this year cost about $\$ 900$ per person, said Mr. Nelson.

Of the band's 50 members, 43 were able to go on the five-day trip which also included visits to

## 3D Printing Students Compete at National Level

As this issue of the Communicator is going to press, attendees at the San Francisco Bay Area Maker Faire are purchasing toys from gumball machines, toys which students have created using 3D printers.
Some of those toys were created by Comstock students. The school which sells the most gumball toys will win a 3D printer from Ultimaker.

Comstock is one of only four schools nationwide invited to take part in this 3 D competition sponsored by Ultimaker, a popular 3D printer company, said Mark Peeters, technology director.

The competition involved creating 3D printed toys which were placed inside two-inch gumball machine capsules. Then, attendees at the Faire vote for their favorites by purchasing the toys from the gumball machines for 50 cents each.
"We will get all the money collected from our machine and if we sell the most, we will win a new Ultimaker 3D printer," said Peeters.
The Bay Area Maker Faire is one of the largest Maker Faires in the world, and was attended by over 145,000 people last year.
"This yearly event receives global news coverage so it's possible we might be featured in news and website media all over the world," he said.

When the invitation came to participate in the San Francisco event, Peeters and the other 3D teachers had to put together an eight-member team rather quickly.
Most all students in fifth through eighth grades have 3D design experience, said Peeters. At the high school, Richard Gibson and Peter O'Connor have taught 3D design classes so many high school students have 3D experience as well.

On the team from the STEM Academy were Lydia Kruis, fifth grade; Jasmer Clare, sixth grade; and Shelby Alexander, seventh grade. NEMS students on the team were Taylar Stratton, sixth grade; and Destiny Ormanovich, eighth grade.

High school students on the team were Na than Saokho, ninth grade; Aidan Emmons ninth grade; and Vincent McNelis, eleventh grade.

This eight-member team then had to come up with ideas and create 1,000 objects to fill the empty two-inch capsules sent to the school by Ultimaker.
"Several groups of students and teachers had brainstorming sessions to get ideas to the 3D Design Team," Peeters said. "Some of the best ideas came from the high school marketing class."

Then, the team created multiple prototypes, factoring in real world issues such as cost of the toy, price of plastic, and how fast the items could be printed so they could meet the competition deadline.
The team made several objects for the capsules including a mini catapult; dragon climber toy that climbs two strings; souvenir Maker Faire keychains and pendants; and a three-piece burr puzzle.
"We hope we win the printer, but even if we don't, this has been a great experience for the students," said Peeters.
This isn't the first time that Comstock has received recognition for its 3D programs. Teachers and students have done national presentations, provided weekend workshops for educators to
build 3D printers, developed K-12 3D printing curriculum and participated in local mini-Maker Faires, said Peeters.
"The 3D printing community is a global one and we've been noticed by Ultimaker as an active school district in the USA," he said.
The other schools invited to participate in the San Francisco Faire are in Virginia, Utah, and New York.
Staff and coaches who guided the students through this project were Kimberly Sandefur and Richard Gibson from STEM; Ryan Cousin from NEMS; and Mark Peeters, technology director.

## Green Meadow Students Benefit from Reading Grant

This year, Green Meadow Elementary benefited from the Early Grade Reading Grant (EGRG), which was awarded to KRESA by the United Way. The grant provided four levels of support for teachers and students at the kindergarten and first grade level.
