## Superintendent's Update

While Tuesday, May 4, 2021, may seem far in the future, the days and weeks will pass quickly. Before we realize it, the snow and ice will be gone, and spring's flowers will be in full bloom.

But why is this date the focus of my update? May 4, 2021, is election day for governmental agencies, local municipalities, and school districts. That means the renewal of the six-year, Kalamazoo County Special Education millage will be on the ballot. This millage helps to reimburse local school districts, such as Comstock Public Schools, for the costs of their special education programs.

In fact, CPS annually receives almost \$700,000 in financial support from the millage. It is important to note that local school districts are mandated by law to provide special education services.

Funds from the millage support quality instruction for students with autism, traumatic brain injury, and emotional trauma, as well as a wide variety of learning disabilities in the areas of reading, writing, math, speech, and language.

Due to voter support and passage of the special

education millage in 2015, Kalamazoo County school districts have been fully reimbursed for the cost of their special education programs.

However, if the millage were to fail in May, it would result in an immediate cut of \$700,000 to Comstock's budget. Since special education services are required by federal law, the budget cuts would come from other areas of our budget which potentially could include instructional, athletic, and extracurricular reductions.

How much would renewal of the countywide special education millage cost taxpayers? Since the millage is a renewal, there would be no increase in taxes. Homeowners would pay the following based on the taxable value of their home, which is typically about half of the market value:

Market Value: \$100,000 Taxable Value: \$50,000 Annual Cost: \$75.00



## Comstock Public Schools Child Study Process

Students may be referred to Child Study if they are not making academic or behavioral progress for an extended period of time and multiple interventions have been attempted, modified, and reviewed. There is a slightly different path to Child Study depending on the reason for the referral. The processes are outlined below:

#### **Academic Referral Process:**

Students are benchmark tested and progress monitored on a regular basis for those students whose scores indicate a need for it. The Professional Learning Community (PLC) reviews the data and interventions are modified to meet students' academic needs on a weekly basis.

- 1) Identify The grade-level PLC team will identify students whose scores have flat-lined.
- 2) Create Interventions The team, including the parent(s), will create interventions that will last approximately six weeks.
- 3) Track Data The team will meet weekly to review progress related to the specific interven-

tion. If an intervention is successful and the student is making gains, there is no additional action required except to continue monitoring data at weekly PLC's.

4) Review Data - After six weeks, the team will decide if the student should continue with the current intervention or start a new intervention. If three separate academic interventions have been attempted with little or no gains made, the student may be referred to Child Study to discuss next steps (outside resources, possible testing, 504 Plan, etc.)

#### **BEHAVIOR REFERRAL PROCESS:**

Most Child Study referrals are related to academic concerns. However, there are times when students might be referred for behavioral concerns. Below you will find some clarification about the Child Study process related to student "behavior".

1) Identify - If you have a student struggling with behavior, the student should first be referred

to the behavior team using the form which is available from the office.

- 2) Create Interventions The team, including the parent(s), will work to create an appropriate intervention.
- 3) Track Data The behavior team and teacher will work together to track data related to the in-
- 4) Review Data If the intervention is unsuccessful, the team will create additional interventions to address the target behaviors.
- 5) Team Meeting Once three separate interventions have been attempted, the behavior team, teacher, and administrative team will meet to review data and create an action plan for the student. At this meeting, the team will decide if the student should be referred to Child Study or find alternative resources to meet the student's needs. This could include outside resources, possible testing, 504 Plan, etc.
- 6) Refer Administration may refer a student to Child Study for behavioral concerns.

## **CPS Child Find Information**

Child Find is a service of the Comstock Public Schools. We work closely with medical, educational, and other community agencies to locate tember 1) individuals with unmet educational or developmental needs.

Child Find seeks to identify and refer individuals with special needs, birth through age 25, for evaluation and possible special assistance, unless a student has previously earned a high school diploma.

Parents or caregivers who have a concern about their children's development may call Comstock Public Schools Special Education Department at 269-250-8925. There is no charge for evaluations

or services.

## O'Donnell Takes Seat on School Board



Newly elected school board member, Kayleen O'Donnell dreamed of running an airport so she got her degree in aviation science and administration at Western Michigan University. But reality hit when she

saw there were few minorities and women in the aviation field. So that sent her off in a different direction.

"That jump started my passion for nontraditional career fields," she said. "That's why I got my master's in workforce education to help women and minorities to realize their dreams and goals and find a career path that they are passionate about."

She graduated from Western Michigan University this past August with a master's degree in workforce education, development and leadership. With that degree she would love to become a career coach but the degree also came with teaching certification in business management and finance. So she could teach and be a career coach at the same time.

Mrs. O'Donnell ran for the school board because she saw it as a way to use both her education and her background. Her mother, who was a teacher, often told her stories which ignited her desire to be in education.

"I have a passion for politics as well," she said. "It goes hand-in-hand, having a degree in education and enjoying political platforms and making a difference in the community."

Her main goal as a school board member is to make sure students are set up for good career opportunities.

"All of my schooling has taught me that students aren't given enough opportunities to realize the different career paths that are out there so they are stuck going to college or working a minimum wage job that they are not passionate about and usually compiling a bunch of debt in the process," she said.

Improving teacher salaries is also one of her goals, she said, noting that teachers are underpaid and under-appreciated.

"I would like to get the community to be more

aware of all that teachers do," she said. "They're not just there from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. They are working on the weekends grading papers. They are putting together different curriculums that are needed for students who are nontraditional, who are falling behind or who are excelling in their grade level. They are passionate about it."

Looking at the Comstock district, she sees diversity as one of its strengths.

"We all want a better future for our children," she said. "I think Comstock can provide that with the diversity and with all of the students coming from different backgrounds and contributing to each classroom individually. Comstock is a great place to really enjoy the diversity of the community around them."

For improvement in the district, she would like to see the enrollment increase, an issue that schools across the state and country are also facing.

"We need to show the community what the schools have to offer and showing our highlights," she said. "The principals do a really good job of highlighting the fantastic teachers and the great curriculums that we have."

Besides her education and background, she brings several other strengths to the board. In her

part-time job as an administrative assistant in the College of Arts and Sciences at WMU, she handles all of the finance operations for her unit.

In addition, she loves talking to people, particularly strangers.

"I get an extreme sense of enjoyment in talking to people I don't know - to figure out where they came from, what they have to contribute to the community and what their life story is," she said. "I hope I can be that ear that will listen to people who just want to reach out to someone to talk about their troubled times or issues they want to bring out. I want to be a friendly face and open ear that they can talk to."

Mrs. O'Donnell and her husband, Brian, a business manager for an electrical union, have two children - Finnegan, 5, a kindergartner at the STEM Academy, and Karlee, 4, who is in preschool at the YMCA. The family enjoys camping and going to Disney World.

She enjoys baking cakes and cupcakes for friends and family for birthdays. She also likes to sew gift items such as bibs and clothes for new babies in the family.

Mrs. O'Donnell took the oath of office in December and began her tenure with the board in January.

## STEM Academy Teacher Wins Grant

STEM Academy teacher, Karyn Medendorp, recently received a \$900 grant from the Kalamazoo Community Foundation.

The money will be used for projects to help determine how healthy the land and water are in the community.

Students will begin the project by conducting a health lab of the forest on school property. They will collect a variety of data ranging from lichen count, tree diameter, canopy cover, vegetation cover, and species diversity. Students will then

conduct soil and water testing from the forest and nearby Morrow Pond.

Students will bring in soil and water samples from their local neighborhoods and these samples will be tested in identical ways to the tests done in the forest and pond.

Students will draw conclusions and present their findings to local public service representatives.

The project will lead to a discussion of community need, local environmental policy, and longterm solutions to ensure public health.

## STEM Addresses Community Issues for Contest

For the sixth year, STEM students have studied community challenges and submitted their solutions in Samsung's Solve for Tomorrow contest to compete for \$100,000 for technology. While the projects submitted by STEM students this year were not selected to continue in the competition, students still learned about these issues and found possible solutions.

"Our team is a little sad, but I am always encouraged when middle school students share what issues are important to them, and work to implement a STEM solution to address it," said Principal Chris Chopp. "We learn as much or more from the things we try and don't succeed, than we do when the path is easy."

Three teams met virtually after school to collaborate on the following issues:

1. Kalamazoo River pollution. Various environmental issues over the years have affected the aquatic ecosystem. Students considered ways to treat Comstock's water resources so as to have a positive impact on the future.

- 2. Mental Health. With mental health becoming an increasing issue, especially given the yearlong pandemic, it's important to raise awareness and use technology and face-to-face intervention to help children, adolescents and adults feel like they are important and part of something bigger. By teaching students at a young age that it is okay to talk about their feelings with counseling and social emotional lessons provided by school counselors, we are helping to eliminate or decrease the stigma. Using technology, we hope to decrease people's fears, address their mental health needs and help them on their own personal path to suc-
- 3. Lack of Necessities. Because of the pandemic, people have lost their jobs and can no longer afford essential supplies. To address that issue, STEM is creating a free store with an website or an app where people can see what is available and get what they need without putting themselves at risk for COVID.

## STEM Academy Creates Nature Activities

To encouraging families to get outside this winter and explore nature together, STEM Academy has partnered with the Kalamazoo Nature Center and the Kellogg Biological Station to create family nature activities for each season. These activities are a part of STEM's bigger place-based stewardship education project that the school is implementing for its students over the next couple of years.

Even when the predominant mode of instruc-

tion is virtual, the STEM Academy is providing opportunities for families to explore nature together.

Here are some winter activities to do with your

- 1. Walk to Morrow Lake. Look for birds and other animals. What type of footprints and scat do you see?
- 2. Go back to the school garden. Find the com-

pass plant, native to Michigan. Find dead flower stems and look for the little holes on the stems. What do you think made those holes and why? Sketch or take a picture of the plant.

- 3. Look for the red-tailed hawk flying above you or perched on trees and posts.
- 4. Take a group picture and share with STEM using #familytime #scienceoutside, and tag us @comstockstem. Go to our website to see the answers to the questions in this activity.
