CHS Math and Science Academy Update By Dr. Jeff Thoenes, Superintendent

As the District continues discussions about the proposed CHS Math and Science Academy, we want to keep you updated on our progress. During September, Assistant Superintendent Jill Ansel had in-depth discussions with the teachers of Comstock Middle School, Comstock STEM Academy, and Comstock High School. She gathered and summarized their professional expertise, opinions, and recommendations regarding the proposal. New ideas, constructive modifications, and positive improvements to the proposal resulted from these discussions.

First, staff overwhelmingly supported changing the name of the proposal from the "Math and Science Academy" to "The Comstock High School STEM Academy."

With the success, reputation, and countywide name recognition of the Comstock STEM Academy which serves grades K-8, the name change eliminates any confusion about what the program entails and directly connects it to our current instructional programming offered at the STEM Academy. Therefore, the program will be called "The Comstock High School STEM Academy."

Secondly, there was also strong consensus that interested students, regardless of grade and whether or not they had attended the K-8 STEM Academy, would be required to apply and be accepted before enrolling in the high school's STEM Academy. The enrollment process and standards for acceptance into the high school's STEM Academy are still to be determined as a part of this design process.

Next, the staff also agreed that the high school's STEM Academy should be innovative in design, and they liked the proposal to provide the curriculum through a co-taught, two-period "block" for math and science, as well as other subject areas which would allow students to receive multiple credits simultaneously. However, from the discussions, a major development occurred. Rather than starting with only a freshman cohort in the com-

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ing year and then growing the program one year at a time, discussions centered on possibly creating "looped" or combined sections. Under this idea, freshmen and sophomores admitted to the program would form one cohort section together while juniors and seniors could form a second cohort section.

This practice would allow more students to be initially involved in the program during the 2023-24 school year and would more likely ensure a stronger start to the high school's STEM Academy. If students enroll in future years in sufficient numbers, it may be possible to create cohorts for each grade.

Facilities Renovation and Construction Update By Dr. Jeff Thoenes, Superintendent

A major goal of our District's 2021-25 Strategic Plan is to "Maintain and Modernize Facilities and Operations." Taking a major step in that direction, our community approved a \$39.4M bond to help ensure the District has the funds and resources to pursue this outcome.

Our staff, students, and families appreciate the community's support for not only the passage of the 2022 bond but also the 2016 bond fund and the 2019 sinking fund. In addition, the District is using a portion of the federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds for renovations. Used in combination, these dynamic monetary resources are empowering the District to create a brighter future for our students, families, and staff.

Therefore, on behalf of the Board of Education and Superintendent Team, here is the latest news regarding the District's efforts to renovate, rebuild, and upgrade our facilities.

Comstock Elementary School - The design process continues for the construction of an outdoor environmental classroom located on the north side of the school. Construction of the facility will take place in the summer of 2023 with an estimated cost of \$50-\$100,000. The District is exploring both grant funding and donations. If an individual or family in the community wishes to sponsor the project, the Board is willing to name the facility in their honor or in the memory of a loved one. If you are interested in exploring this conversation, contact me at your earliest convenience.

Comstock Middle School - At Comstock Middle School, efforts continue to finalize Phase 1 of the three-phase renovation begun this summer. The summer crews transformed six rooms along the east side of the building, but due to supply chain issues, they did not have all of the materials to complete the work before the start of school.

However, now the vertical unit ventilators (VUVs), which are units that provide heating in winter and cooling in summer, arrived in late October. Crews quickly and successfully installed the units which now provide much needed warmth given the onset of cooler fall temperatures.

Importantly, over winter break, crews will in-

stall new cabinetry and hallway doors in the six Phase 1 rooms, and finish painting sections of the hallway. The District is financing the work using a combination of federal ESSER monies and sinking funds.

Due to the age of the building and the requisites involved in the upgrades, the project has two more phases (Summer 2023 and Summer 2024). However, when completed in August, 2024, for the start of the 2024-25 school year, both the interior and exterior of the school will be fully modernized and air-conditioned.

Comstock High School - By the time this Communicator goes to press, the construction work on the Hamet Athletic Complex should be completed. This is the final project being funded by the 2016 bond. The facility now boasts a beautifully-designed gated entrance featuring a ticket booth with windows on three sides and a fully modernized restroom building.

This new building is much larger and more aesthetically pleasing than the previous version and includes two sets of men's and women's bathrooms, two family bathrooms, a storage room, and a utility closet.

Four sets of drinking fountains and bottle filling stations are located on the outside of the restroom building. Connecting the ticket booth and restroom building is a spacious patio with aesthetically-pleasing, inground, blue metallic benches and picnic tables. Strategically located landscaping complements the space. The entire community will be invited to attend the Hamet Athletic Complex ribbon-cutting ceremony sometime in April on a day and time to be determined.

On a related note, with the successful passage of the Board's \$39.4M bond proposal in May, 2022, this fall a design team consisting of representatives from the Superintendent Team, GMB Architecture, Miller-Davis Construction, and AE Tech Design began discussions and planning sessions for facility improvements targeted at CHS.

Starting in the summer of 2023, the District will prioritize the following four major projects at the school:

1. Roof repair and replacement - At the October 24 Board meeting, the Board of Education approved the pre-purchase of materials that will

be used in the summer of 2023 for roof repair and replacement. By pre-purchasing in the fall, the District will save approximately 12-15 percent or \$250,000 in costs from the overall roofing project which is now estimated at a total cost of \$1,500,000 instead of \$1,750,000. This work should be completed sometime in the fall of the 2023-24 school year.

2. HVAC Renovations - Using ESSER funds, the District will begin interior renovations focusing on installing modernized heating and cooling systems. This work will take approximately one year to complete.


3. Phase 2 of the Hamet Athletic Complex Renovations - This second and final phase of the Hamet Athletic Complex renovations involves the full replacement of the track, long jump, high jump, and pole vault pits, the construction of new shot put and discus areas, and improvements to fencing. As a part of this project, the District will convert the old restroom facility into a team meeting room with some space for storage.

4. Interior Renovations - Finally, in September, 2023, the District will begin phased renovations to the interior of Comstock High School. In similar fashion to the process used at Comstock Elementary School, sections of the building under construction will be walled off and accessible only to construction workers and architects. Students and staff will not be able to access these areas. The renovations will include, but not be limited to, new flooring, lighting, windows, and doors; ongoing installation of HVAC (heating, ventilation, and air conditioning) systems; renovations to the woodshop classroom; upgrades to science classrooms; and the redesigning of the band room.

STEM Academy

In the spring of 2023, a STEM Academy design team will begin visiting similar school buildings in southwest Michigan to gather ideas and information about potential designs or features for a modern school building. Design meetings and discussions will follow beginning in the summer and concluding by late fall 2023. Construction is scheduled to begin in the summer of 2024 and take about two years to complete with the new school opening in August, 2026, for the 2026-27 school year.

Leadership Team Studies Justice-themed Book



The District's Leadership Team (administrators and principals) is reading *The Four Pivots: Reimagining Justice, Reimagining Ourselves* by Shawn Ginwright, PhD. This is an effort to prioritize the District's strategic plan.

Dr. Ginwright breaks down the common myths of

social movements – a set of deeply ingrained beliefs that the author claims actually hold people back from healing and achieving sustainable systemic change. He explains why these frames don't work, proposing instead four revolutionary pivots for better activism and collective leadership:

Awareness: From Lens to Mirror

Connections: From Transactional to Transformative

Vision: From Problem to Possibility

Presence: From Hustle to Flow

Supplemented with reflections, prompts, cutting-edge research, and the author's own insights and lived experiences as an African-American social scientist, professor, and movement builder, *The Four Pivots* helps people uncover their blind spots. It shows how to discover new lenses and boldly assert the need for connection, transformation, trust, wholeness, and healing.

It gives people permission to create a better future – to acknowledge that a broken system has been predefining people's dreams and limiting what they are allowed to imagine, but that it doesn't have to be that way at all.

To promote a vision or equity, diversity, inclusion, and justice consistent with the Strategic Plan's Learning Environment & Culture section, team members participate each month in a rich discussion or activity relating to a pivot within the book. For example, one team activity asked all participants to:

Make the decision to practice "mirror work" every day by asking themselves a question like "what am I learning about myself and how better to serve our society?"


Solicit feedback from people they trust and feel safe with, people who are close to them and listen without being defensive. Ask them, "If there was one thing I need to work on, what would you say it should be?"

Tell someone close to them the three most important lessons they have learned about themselves last year and how they are building on these lessons.

Assistant Superintendent Jill Ansel connected with this quote from the book: "When groups invest in the time for everyone to share their story, the bond serves as a type of group-dynamics insurance policy."

The Leadership Team will be discussing this book in detail throughout the 2022-23 school year.



CELA Principal Joins Great Start Board



Comstock Early Learning Academy (CELA) Principal Meadow Nuyen was invited to join the Executive Board for Great Start Collaborative in Kalamazoo County.

The invitation came from Laura Ynclan, an early childhood specialist with the Kalamazoo Regional Educational Service Agency (KRESA).

A focus of the board is the alignment of care and services for children between birth and school age, said Ynclan. They want childcare directors and administrators connected with school districts to serve on the board.

The Great Start Collaborative Executive Board is composed of leaders from various sectors of early childhood including medical, mental health, family/home visitors, early care and education, special education, birth-3, and literacy consultants.

The board also serves as the School Readiness Advisory Board, a group mandated by the Michigan Department of Education to look at a variety of early childhood topics.

The board's work has a strong family focus, centered in the Protective Factors from the Strengthening Families Program. Those factors are parental resilience, social connections, concrete support in times of need, knowledge of parenting and child development, and social and emotional competence of children.

The board will be emphasizing two areas this year: mental health/social emotional support, especially to families, and alignment across early care and education settings.

Dolly Parton Program Donates Books

Dolly Parton's Imagination Library will soon be sending free books to children in Comstock. The Imagination Library, funded by Dolly Parton and local community partners, sends free books to children from birth to age five.

Comstock Early Learning Academy Principal Meadow Nuyen and her team along with Comstock Township Library Youth Librarian Liz Castleberry have been engaged in an ongoing collaborative effort to finalize the process which was recently approved by the library board.

Children in the community will be able to enroll in the program and select and receive new, age-appropriate books mailed directly to their homes each month at no cost to the family. More details will be coming soon from the library. Started in 1995, the Imagination Library program now spans five countries and gives over one million free books each month to children around the world. Dolly was inspired to create this program by her father's inability to read and write.

"When I was growing up in the hills of East Tennessee, I knew my dreams would come true," said Dolly. "I know there are children in your community with their own dreams. They dream of becoming a doctor or an inventor or a minister. Who knows, maybe there is a little girl whose dream is to be a writer and singer. The seeds of these dreams are often found in books and the seeds you help plant in your community can grow across the world."

District Receives Additional USDA Funds to Purchase Healthy Food

The District has received a second allocation from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Supply Chain Assistance Funds.

These funds, valued at \$37,692, may only be used to purchase domestic unprocessed or min-

imally processed foods. Examples include fluid milk, cheese, yogurt, fruits and vegetables, pasta and rice, and meats. Foods may be whole, cut, pureed, fresh, frozen, canned, and dried.

Foods that are not permitted to be purchased

with these funds include pre-made pizza, bread, muffins, crackers, pre-packaged sandwiches, and chicken nuggets.
